The purpose of the presentation is to deliver a certificate of appreciation from ISED Minister **Philippe Champagne** in recognition of Metro Vancouver's 20 year support of the Computers for Schools Program.

Established in 1993, the Computers for Schools program collects donations of used computers from businesses and government for refurbishment by youth on paid internships for distribution to schools, non profit organizations and low income families.

Metro Vancouver has been a donor for over 20 years and we recognize your long-standing commitment to protecting our environment through reusing computer technology. Reuse is a key component of a circular economy and achieving zero waste goals.

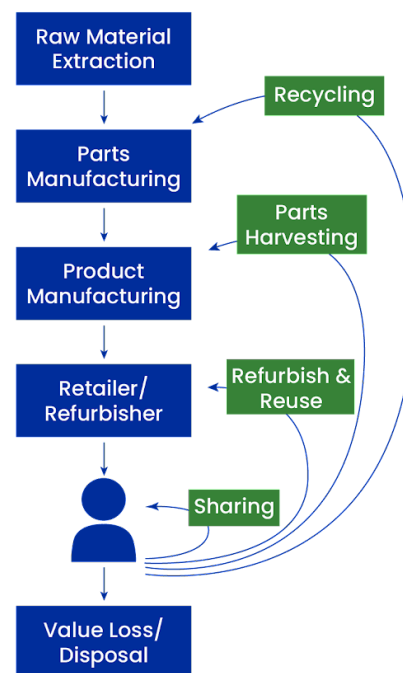
Ensuring a reduction in manufacturing is vital for environmental sustainability and the protection of people and the planet. The manufacturing process is a heavy investment of minerals, water, and energy.

The manufacture of a computer and its screen requires a minimum of:

- ➔ 240 kg (530 pounds) of fossil fuels;
- ➔ 22 kg (48 pounds) of chemicals;
- ➔ 5 tons of water (a single computer chip needs 9 gallons of water!)

By keeping used technology out of the waste streams, Metro Vancouver has ensured donated computers and laptops have landed back in the hands of those who need them while making a strong environmental impact. Equipment donated to BC Tech often **doubles** its useful life, significantly eliminating e-waste in landfills, reducing greenhouse gas emissions, preserving natural resources, and conserving more energy than recycling prematurely.

Since 2008, Metro Vancouver has donated 2500 computers and laptops to BC Tech. Another area of support includes producing a [video](#) that detailed the impacts our work has on communities, as well as the environment.

- Tech for Home

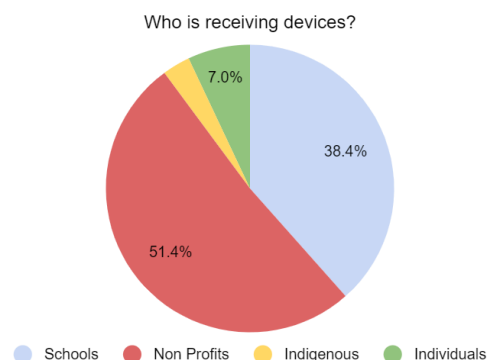

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## **RECOMMENDATION**

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## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The 2023 Zero Waste Conference (the Conference) occurred November 1 and 2, and was, as with previous events, well-received by participants. Hosted by Metro Vancouver, the Conference included international, national, and local speakers and stories, and met its goal of attracting nearly 600 participants. The Conference featured the connections between waste prevention, circular solutions, and a heightened emphasis on climate through the theme of “Climate Action through Circularity”. As requested by past participants, the Conference included an increase in networking opportunities. In response to input from participants and partnering organizations, this report also introduces the Zero Waste Committee to the intention that in future years, Metro Vancouver shifts to delivering the Conference biannually, with the next one in 2025.

## **PURPOSE**

This report provides a summary of the Zero Waste Conference hosted by Metro Vancouver in November 2023 and a look ahead to future Conference delivery.

## **BACKGROUND**

The Zero Waste Conference, hosted by Metro Vancouver supports the first two goals of the Integrated Solid Waste and Resource Management Plan related to waste prevention. The Conference attracts interest from all orders of government, the business sector, sustainability practitioners, academia, and the broader general public within the region and across Canada. The focus, on waste prevention, looks to solutions that are outside of the geographic region of any one region or city, and require national and international system changes.

## **ZERO WASTE CONFERENCE – A Component of Zero Waste Collaboration Initiatives**

The Zero Waste Conference is one component of Metro Vancouver’s Zero Waste Collaboration Initiatives where the other two components are the National Zero Waste Council and Love Food Hate Waste. Each are distinct, but weave together ideas and aligned audiences. The focus on all three is the prevention of waste. The Conference is in its 11th year, and in recent years has expanded from one to two days’ delivery, attracted over 500 participants annually, and connected to speakers and ideas from across the globe.



### **2023 Program Highlights**

As noted to the Committee in the report dated October 12, 2023, “Zero Waste Conference Update”, the 2023 program included both consistent and new components.

Day 1 started with a thoughtful and warm welcome from Tsawwassen First Nation Elder, Ruth Adams. This was followed by a welcome from three governments including the Prime Minister, Premier, and Metro Vancouver Board Chair. A consistent feature from previous years was the Day 1 programming, with a line-up of local and international speakers addressing circular opportunities for urban form, plastics, and textiles. Conference staff put particular focus on attracting youth participants and noted that of the nearly 550 participants, 76 were students. The agenda also included a new feature in the form of table-based conversations for participants, which was highlighted as a very positive experience in participant feedback forms.

Completely new for 2023 were the Day 2 workshops, each addressing a different waste challenge; cities, food, textiles, and consumer habits. These were co-hosted, taking advantage of the strong partnerships among Metro Vancouver, the National Zero Waste Council, and multiple national partners. Workshops used a variety of delivery models such as plenary, table discussions, and a Samoan Circle to engage participants. As with the table-based conversations, feedback from the participant survey indicates these were a highly valued component of the 2023 program.

Day 2 ended for most participants at the end of the workshops at noon. Members of the National Zero Waste Council then re-grouped for the Council AGM. Part of the AGM agenda included a debrief on the Conference, and this group also expressed positive feedback on the new features.

### **2024 Responding to a Changing Landscape**

Metro Vancouver’s Zero Waste Collaboration Initiatives launched in 2012 in support of the then-new Integrated Solid Waste and Resource Management Program. Even in this short history the portfolio has made substantial progress on advancing waste prevention and circular economy concepts locally and nationally and will continue to do so. The Zero Waste Collaboration Initiatives are undergoing a comprehensive review, both reflecting on the successes, but also considering the current landscape, where new organizations have launched in this space, and societal priorities, where climate and emissions are a critical priority. The Zero Waste Committee will receive an update in the March agenda.

For the Conference component, Metro Vancouver will continue to deliver the Zero Waste Conference. Delivery will shift to alternate years, with the next in 2025. This aligns with a network of organizations working in the circular economy sector that attract partially-overlapping audiences. It creates space for these aligned organizations to support one another’s activities rather than compete for attention. This also responds to feedback from participants who, while indicating an ongoing need for Metro Vancouver’s Conference as one of the few places with a Zero Waste focus, also note their own work plans and event calendars have competing activities. Bi-annual (alternating) delivery meets this request. The Zero Waste Conference can be scheduled in consideration for example for events such as Globe Forum or a CELC (Circular Economy Leadership Canada) program. In addition, this opens the opportunity for the team delivering the Conference to

explore new program ideas and continue to offer content that is fresh and directly applicable to current priorities.

#### **ALTERNATIVES**

This is an information report. No alternatives are presented.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The Conference is supported through the 2023 General Government Program of \$212,000 and the remainder through registration fees. There will be substantial savings through shifting to a bi-annual program delivery. Conference-related programming in the non-delivery years will be developed as an annual workplan.

#### **CONCLUSION**

The 2023 National Zero Waste Conference was delivered with success and on budget. Participants expressed a very high level of satisfaction. The Conference program included a combination of presentations, audience participation, thought leaders, and networking opportunities. New in 2023 was a workshop series co-delivered among a network of leaders in the zero waste and circular economy landscape. Staff included a focus on youth participation in the promotions, and youth, as future leaders, were a visible portion of the audience. Staff continue to plan for future delivery of the Zero Waste Conference, ensuring content is fresh and current, and scheduling aligns with other organizations in the circular economy landscape. This includes shifting from annual to bi-annual Conference delivery.

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### **2024 Work Plan**

The attachment sets out the Zero Waste Committee's work plan for 2024. The status of each work plan priority is indicated as pending, in progress, or complete. The work plan is updated, as needed, to include new priorities that arise, items requested by the Zero Waste Committee, and changes to the schedule.

A new item has been added to the work plan for the third quarter: Multi-Family Residential Waste Prevention. At the January 11, 2024, Zero Waste Committee meeting, the Committee requested staff to bring back information on actions Metro Vancouver is taking to help advance waste reduction in the multi-family residential sector. Staff was requested to examine the Zero Waste Committee's 2024 work plan and incorporate initiatives for engagement with multi-family building residents, strata corporations, management companies and their associations, and service providers on actions to help increase waste reduction and recycling in this sector. Staff was requested to update the committee work plan in February to include reporting on these actions.

### **Smart Waste Program and Draft Tipping Fee Bylaw Updates**

At the July 13, 2023, Zero Waste Committee meeting, Metro Vancouver introduced draft updates to the Tipping Fee Bylaw and a new smart waste program to help promote compliance with the generator levy provisions of the *Greater Vancouver Sewerage and Drainage District Tipping Fee and Solid Waste Disposal Regulation Bylaw No. 306, 2017*, as amended (Tipping Fee Bylaw).

Following engagement in the fall of 2023, Metro Vancouver further revised the draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates and developed a draft smart waste program implementation plan, incorporating feedback received.

Metro Vancouver will provide engagement summary reports, along with the revised draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates and draft smart waste program implementation plan, to interested parties for further written feedback.

The draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates will then be provided to the Zero Waste Committee and Board for consideration.

### *Draft Tipping Fee Bylaw Updates*

The draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates simplify and improve consistency of definitions, strengthen records management requirements, and improve enforceability of the bylaw. The list below highlights some of the changes since the July 2023 draft reflected in the revised draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates, incorporating engagement feedback from 2023:

- Ability for Metro Vancouver to waive the generator levy in the event of a service disruption at a Metro Vancouver or City of Vancouver solid waste facility.
- Removal of requirement for operating logs and routing information for collection vehicles.
- Ability for haulers to redact building street address number of each collection location.
- Exemption of construction and demolition waste from generator levy records management requirements (loads of construction and demolition waste are exempt from payment of the generator levy, but the original draft did not exempt construction and demolition waste from record keeping requirements).
- A reduction of future tipping fees of up to \$3,000 per submission of records to offset costs incurred by haulers in assembling and submitting records.
- A provision to allow Compliance Managers or Officers to have accompanying persons or equipment to assist in reviewing and copying records to align with the *GVS&DD Act* provisions related to inspections.

### *Smart Waste Program*

The smart waste program involves depositing location-based electronic devices in publicly accessible, multi-family residential and commercial/institutional garbage containers. The program will help assess if the generator levy is being appropriately collected and remitted, and enhances understanding of the movement of waste around the region. The draft smart waste program implementation plan incorporates feedback received during engagement, and describes:

- An annual testing program where approximately 20 devices per year will be placed in publicly accessible multi-family residential and commercial/institutional garbage containers. Company or organization names on garbage containers will not be recorded;
- Criteria for placement of additional devices in a specific company or organization's garbage containers, such as unexplained and material changes in quantities of garbage; and
- Annual public reporting.

### **Attendance at 2024 Standing Committee Events – Reminder and Update**

As presented in the Manager's Report in the January 11, 2024, Zero Waste Committee agenda, participation at external events provides important learning and networking opportunities. The opportunities listed below were included in the January 2024 Zero Waste Committee agenda, with the addition of a new opportunity: Climate Week, New York City, which is an option for expression of interest as an alternative to the Coast Waste Management or Solid Waste Management Association of North America conferences.

- ***Coast Waste Management Association of British Columbia Annual Conference***  
Date and Place: October 23 - 25, Victoria, BC  
Coast Waste Management Association Annual Conference is the premier waste management industry and networking event on Vancouver Island with attendees from across British Columbia and North America. This popular annual event brings together leaders in the waste management community to exchange knowledge, inspire solutions, and build connections.
- ***Solid Waste Association of North America (SWANA) Wastecon Conference***  
Date and Place: October 21 – 24, Dallas, Texas  
SWANA's Wastecon Conference provides an opportunity to participate in sessions on waste reduction, recycling, and residuals management.
- ***Climate Week NYC***  
Date and Place: September 22 – 29 (TBC), New York City, New York  
Climate Group's Climate Week brings together business leaders, political change makers, local decision takers and civil society representatives, to drive the transition, speed up progress, and champion change needed to be on a path to net-zero. The events program runs across several different event themes so delegates can compile an agenda that fits their interests.

#### **Zero Waste Committee Facilities Tour**

A tour of three regional solid waste facilities is being planned for Zero Waste Committee members for early 2024. The purpose of the tour would be to provide Zero Waste Committee members with first-hand insight into the operation of three major regional solid waste facilities, to gain a better understanding of the solid waste system. This supports the Committee's role of providing oversight on Metro Vancouver solid waste policies, programs, and projects.

Three facilities have been chosen to provide a varied, well-rounded experience. United Boulevard Recycling and Waste Centre is a full-service facility accepting recyclables and garbage from large and small vehicles with a recycling depot ahead of the scales. The Metro Vancouver Waste-to-Energy Facility and Vancouver Landfill are two regional disposal sites.

#### **2024 Textiles Waste Reduction Campaign Update**

The 2024 "Think Thrice About Your Clothes" campaign will be in market from Monday, February 26 to Sunday, April 28. This is the sixth year of the campaign. The campaign objective is to increase diversion of textiles from the waste stream by raising awareness of the textile waste problem and empowering residents to take action. The primary audience is 18 - 44 year olds, skewed towards women as they tend to purchase/shop more frequently for clothing, footwear, accessories, linens, and other fabrics. The strategy emphasizes reduction through thrifting and identifying long-lasting items while encouraging reuse and clarifying what clothing can be donated/recycled and where. The campaign's tone is positive and leverages the existing "caring owners" platform, focusing on clothing items and the stories they collect. Tactics include digital (Pinterest, YouTube, Instagram, Facebook, influencer content, Google search ads), television PSA, radio ads and host endorsements, out-of-home placements (SkyTrain posters, super bus kings, transit, and post-secondary LED

screens), and community outreach events. The campaign [website](http://www.Think-Thrice.ca) (www.Think-Thrice.ca) features tips and information on how residents can reduce clothing consumption, how to care for clothing, and options for donating/recycling unwanted items.

### **Right to Repair**

Bill C-244 was passed with unanimous consent in the House of Commons on October 18, 2023. If approved by the Senate, it will amend the *Copyright Act* to allow circumvention of technical protection measures for the purposes of diagnosis, maintenance, and repair of certain products. Original equipment manufacturers (OEMs) sometimes prevent the ability of third parties to perform repairs by restricting access to their proprietary software. The proposed regulations aim to give Canadians the right to have their vehicle, cell phone, and other such products with OEM software repaired by any service provider at a fair cost. The bill also aims to help reduce climate impact and prevent waste by allowing customers to extend the life of their products.

The right to repair movement is gaining momentum in North America. In October 2023 the Quebec *Consumer Protection Act* was amended to ban the sale and manufacturing of goods for which obsolescence is planned. The Quebec legislation also defines the legal warranty in a way that it stays with the product, not the original purchaser, to address warranty issues with the resale of products. Additionally, there are requirements for manufacturers to supply replacement parts and provide information on how to maintain and repair products. Similar regulations are also being pursued in the USA in states such as California, New York (electronics), Colorado (agricultural equipment), and Minnesota (electronics). California is cited as having the most stringent laws with requirements for manufacturers to keep repair materials available for up to seven years even for discontinued products.
