This greenway is part of the regional greenway network. The completed section runs 6.5 km from Mud Bay to 64th Ave. The proposed extension, some of which is adjacent to the Delta Nature Reserve, will continue towards the Alex Fraser Bridge.

Delta Nature Reserve

Part of the Burns Bog Ecological Conservancy Area, the Delta Nature Reserve has been identified as the area of the bog lands to be open to the public. Along the eastern edge of the reserve is the proposed route of the Delta South Surrey Regional Greenway.

Burns Bog Conservation Society

Formed in 1988, the society worked to help Burns Bog become a conservation area. The society now delivers education programs and stewardship events at the Delta Nature Reserve. To participate or find out more, go to burnsbog.org.

Trails and Recreation

Hiking



Boardwalks in the Delta Nature Reserve are pedestrian only. Cyclists - please walk bikes. Rustic boardwalks have uneven surfaces and can be very slippery when wet; use extra care.

Shared Trail







The greenway is open for hiking, horseback riding and cycling. Pedestrians yield

to equestrians; cyclists yield to pedestrians and equestrians. To minimize erosion and habitat damage, stay on designated trails. Cycling and horseback riding are not permitted on boardwalks in the Delta Nature Reserve.

Dogs



Dogs must be leashed and under control. To protect wildlife habitat, dogs are not permitted in creeks, streams, or wetlands.

Bog plants and birds are easily affected by dogs; keep dogs on designated trails and boardwalks. Please scoop up your dog's poop and dispose of it properly.

Drinking Water and Toilets





There is no public source of drinking water; bring what you need. Toilets are only available at Mud Bay Park.

Accessibility



The greenway trail is not considered accessible for wheelchair users because of difficulty at access points. The greenway is

accessible for strollers, but trail surface conditions may be affected by intermittent flooding. Within the nature reserve, trails consist of boardwalks that are not wheelchair accessible.

No Liquor, No Cannabis, No Camping and No Smoking









Liquor, cannabis, and camping are not permitted in the park. Smoking is not permitted in regional parks.

Enjoy the Park Safely

Regional parks are natural areas and can present hazards for the unprepared. Be prepared for changing conditions. Due to site conditions, some trail sections may be flooded after heavy rainfall. Obey all signs.

Hazards

Most of the greenway is along sewer and stormwater access routes - be prepared to encounter large trucks. The greenway crosses a railway and follows roads in some places; be aware of your surroundings.

In case of emergency, phone 9-1-1 for fire, **911** ambulance, and police services.


