MEETING MINUTES

Co-Chair Craig Hodge called the meeting to order at 2:03 p.m. and welcomed attendees to the Solid Waste and Recycling Industry Advisory Committee meeting.

1. AGENDA

1.1 September 12, 2023 Meeting Agenda

Co-Chair Hodge called for additions or changes to the agenda. No additions were put forward. The Co-Chair extended gratitude to Mary Polak, former IAC Co-Chair, for her dedication to the IAC for the past year, and noted that nominations for a new Co-Chair would be welcomed in Item 5 of the agenda. Participants were reminded to use the Zoom "raised hand" function to provide questions or comments and for voting purposes.

2. MINUTES

2.1 July 11, 2023 Meeting Minutes

No errors or omissions were put forward.

3. REPORTS

3.1 IAC Meeting Procedures

Paul Henderson, General Manager, Solid Waste Services, Metro Vancouver, referred to the IAC Meeting Procedures report provided with the agenda package and offered comments including:

- Staff will endeavour to post all materials related to Industry Advisory Committee meetings on the webpage one week prior to meetings (the terms of reference states 72 hours)
- Use of Zoom protocols and use of Zoom "raised hand" function to submit questions and to vote
- No virtual option for attendance at designated in-person meetings; observers must also attend in person
- Virtual meetings are live streamed through a link available publicly on the IAC webpage
- Virtual meeting recordings will be posted to the IAC webpage after each meeting
- Third-party note taker will continue to provide the record of the meetings

3.2 Performance Metrics Scope

Terry Fulton, Senior Project Engineer, Metro Vancouver, and Todd Baker, Morrison Hershfield, reviewed a presentation titled "Performance Metrics Scope – Metro Vancouver's Solid Waste Management Plan Update", and informed of a study on current and emerging metrics, and what might be applicable to the region. Feedback will be sought from IAC members and other advisory committees

During the presentation, the following was highlighted:

- Background and process
- Vision and guiding principles phase

- Retention of Morrison Hershfield and Delaney to assist through the plan process with both technical and engagement tasks
- Current suite of performance metrics
- Morrison Hershfield's scope of work:
 - Jurisdictional and organizational review to identify and assess potential alternative targets and performance metrics
 - Development of a list of potential performance targets that are meaningful and make sense for the Metro Vancouver region
 - Review of existing Metro Vancouver performance metrics
- Tracking performance through the 5Rs Waste Reduction Hierarchy, reducing greenhouse gas emissions, supporting social equity, increasing education and awareness, and transitioning to a circular economy.

Committee members were asked to provide input on available data, how the scope tied in with the broader goals and objectives of the solid waste management plan, where to focus research, what jurisdictions to include, and what targets and data were important.

During discussion and in response to questions, comments were offered regarding:

- Exploring possible metrics to track social equity
- Ensuring consistent accessibility to services
- Review applicability of metrics used in other jurisdictions
- Consider data privacy in the private sector and implications of requesting data from private facilities
- Accuracy of information

4. OTHER BUSINESS

4.1 Zero Waste Committee Updates

Paul Henderson advised that the Zero Waste Committee meetings are now being livestreamed. The next Zero Waste Committee meeting will be held on September 14, 2023, and will include the following reports: "Waste-to-Energy Facility Environmental Monitoring" and "Reporting 2022 Update and Summary of Municipal Waste Collection Service Models".

In response to a question, it was noted that the July 2023 Zero Waste Committee Meeting had not been recorded; however, the draft meeting minutes were available.

4.2 October Workshop Planning

Stephanie Liu, Senior Engagement Specialist, Metro Vancouver, provided an overview of the in-person Industry Advisory Committee meeting and workshop scheduled for October 3, 2023, noting the workshop will be facilitated by Engage Delaney. The workshop will focus on the smart waste program and the draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates

IAC members were advised of the opportunity to contact Engage Delaney directly prior to the October 3, 2023 workshop with any comments on how to frame the discussion and make the most of the session.

4.3 2023 IAC Action Tracker and Summarize Meeting Action Items

Paul Henderson referred to the action tracker and provided a progress update.

4.4 Solid Waste Management Plan Public Engagement

Samantha Joy, Engagement Specialist, Solid Waste Services, gave an update on current public engagement opportunities supporting the solid waste management plan update. An email will be sent to Industry Advisory Committee members with more information on scheduled events and how to participate.

4.5 2023 Zero Waste Conference IAC Member Attendance

Committee members were invited to register for the 2023 Zero Waste Conference being held November 1-2, 2023, noting their attendance would be at no cost.

Co-Chair Hodge called for nominations for the role of Co-Chair of the IAC Industry Advisory Committee. Hearing none, the Co-Chair called a second time for nominations. Hearing none, Co-Chair Hodge called a third time for nominations for the role of Co-Chair. Hearing none, the Chair deferred the Co-Chair nominations and election to the meeting scheduled for October 3, 2023. As per the IAC Terms of Reference, nominations can be made on the same day as the election. Anyone interested in the Co-Chair role is invited to contact Co-Chair Hodge directly.

Prior to the meeting close, Industry Advisory Committee member Ken Carrusca, who was not available to comment during the call for nominations for the IAC Co-Chair, nominated Michael Zarbl to be Co-Chair. Michael Zarbl accepted the nomination.



DRAFT TIPPING FEE BYLAW UPDATES: OVERVIEW GENERATOR LEVY - \$59 / TONNE

- The Tipping Fee Bylaw, including the generator levy, is authorized through the GVS&DD Act
- Generator levy came into effect January 1, 2018



BENEFITS OF GENERATOR LEVY



Definitions related to record keeping requirements

Term	Draft Definition
Collection Location	an address from which a Waste Hauler picks up or transports Solid Waste
Compliance Manager	the person employed by MVRD as the Director of Environmental Regulation and Enforcement and includes any person designated to act in their place from time to time
Compliance Officer	a person employed by MVRD as an Environmental Control Officer, a Permitting and Enforcement Officer or an Assistant Permitting and Enforcement Officer
Generator	a person who generates Solid Waste, and includes a person who uses the services of a Waste Hauler for the pick up, transport or delivery of Solid Waste
Generator Levy	the levy payable by a Generator pursuant to this Bylaw at the rate set out at section 5.1

Term	Draft Definition
Product Steward	a legal entity, such as an organization, company or non-profit society, that develops and implements extended producer responsibility plans for managing the recovery of Product Stewardship Materials and fulfilling the obligations under the Recycling Regulation
Receiving Facility	a Solid Waste Facility, Vancouver Disposal Site or other facility or location to which a Waste Hauler delivers Solid Waste
Vehicle Operating Log	data associated with the pick up, transport or delivery of Solid Waste by a Waste Hauler's vehicle during each shift, including the Collection Location from which Solid Waste is picked up or transported, the number of kilometres over which the vehicle is driven during a shift, and the number of hours during which a vehicle is operated for the purpose of picking up, transporting or delivering Solid Waste, but excluding information related to the vehicle operator's job performance such as the number or timing of off-duty hours

DRAFT RECORD KEEPING REQUIREMENTS

Shortened from Bylaw for simplicity

Record Required

- (a) the units of measure and quantity picked up from or transported for Generators within the geographic area of the GVS&DD, for every Load
- (b) the units of measure and quantity picked up from or transported for Generators within the geographic area of the GVS&DD and delivered to a Solid Waste Facility or Vancouver Disposal Site, for every Load
- (c) the units of measure and quantity picked up from or transported for Generators within the geographic area of the GVS&DD and delivered to a Receiving Facility other than Solid Waste Facility or a Vancouver Disposal Site, for every Load
- (d) the units of measure and quantity picked up from or transported for Generators within the geographic area of the GVS&DD and mixed with waste from outside the geographic area of the GVS&DD, including the approximate breakdown of the percentage of each Load from within the geographic area of the GVS&DD
- (e) the name and address of the Receiving Facility and date and time (including Loads mixed with waste from outside the geographic area of the GVS&DD)

DRAFT RECORD KEEPING REQUIREMENTS

Shortened from Bylaw for simplicity

Record Required

- (f) the Collection Location(s) for each Load from within the geographic area of the GVS&DD
- (g) the number of containers for each material type and each container's volume at each Collection Location within the geographic area of the GVS&DD
- (h) the dates on which the Waste Hauler picked up from each Collection Location within the geographic area of the GVS&DD
- (i) daily routing information for vehicles picking up or transporting Municipal Solid Waste from within the geographic area of the GVS&DD
- (j) for each vehicle that picks up or transports a Load of Municipal Solid Waste from within the geographic area of the GVS&DD: (i) the vehicle identification number; (ii) the capacity of the vehicle; and (iii) Vehicle Operating Logs
- (k) for each Load from within the geographic area of the GVS&DD, the weigh scale tickets or receipts from the applicable Receiving Facility
- (I) if the records created by the Waste Hauler do not use the definitions in this Bylaw to describe the materials, a glossary of terms used in the records created by the Waste Hauler

DRAFT RECORD KEEPING REQUIREMENTS

DRAFT UPDATED EXEMPTIONS

- Loads of construction and demolition waste and sourceseparated recyclables delivered to private facilities continue to be exempt from the generator levy.
- Record keeping related exemptions:
 - Single-family residential garbage, source separated recyclables or product stewardship materials collected by municipalities, their contractors or product stewardship agencies are exempt from some record keeping requirements.
 - A provision will also be added to exempt construction and demolition waste from records management requirements.

Draft Tipping Fee Bylaw Updates

The draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates streamline definitions, strengthen records management requirements, and improve enforceability of the bylaw.

Key information


The draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates build on generator levy requirements in the Tipping Fee Bylaw that came into effect January 1, 2018. The draft updates do not change the types of materials the generator levy applies to, and specifically construction and demolition waste delivered to private facilities is not subject to the generator levy. Feedback during engagement will help inform a revision of the draft Tipping Fee Bylaw updates.

Generator levy

- Key contributor to Metro Vancouver's continued success in advancing waste reduction, recycling, greenhouse gas emission reductions, and a circular economy.
- The generator levy is included in the garbage tipping fee collected at regional solid waste facilities (\$59 per tonne in 2023, or roughly half the garbage tipping fee); however, if garbage from residential or commercial/ institutional sources is delivered to other facilities, haulers must collect and remit the generator levy to Metro Vancouver.
- Generator levy benefits:
 - i. encourages waste reduction as disposal bans can be applied at regional solid waste facilities
 - ii. ensures all garbage generators contribute to funding the fixed costs of the regional solid waste system.
- The Tipping Fee Bylaw, including the generator levy, is authorized through the GVS&DD Act.

Updated definitions

The following diagram summarizes the relationships among materials included in the Tipping Fee Bylaw definitions.

Updated record keeping requirements

Record keeping requirements in the draft Tipping Fee Bylaw are summarized below. Requirements have been shortened for simplicity. Please refer to the <u>July 13, 2023 Zero Waste Committee report</u> (Item 5.4: Draft Tipping Fee Bylaw Updates) for precise descriptions of each requirement:

- (a) the units of measure and quantity picked up from or transported for Generators within the geographic area of the GVS&DD, for every Load;
- (b) the units of measure and quantity picked up from or transported for Generators within the geographic area of the GVS&DD and delivered to a Solid Waste Facility or Vancouver Disposal Site, for every Load;
- (c) the units of measure and quantity picked up from or transported for Generators within the geographic area of the GVS&DD and delivered to a Receiving Facility other than Solid Waste Facility or a Vancouver Disposal Site, for every Load;
- (d) the units of measure and quantity picked up from or transported for Generators within the geographic area of the GVS&DD and mixed with waste from outside the geographic area of the GVS&DD, including the approximate break-down of the percentage of each Load from within the geographic area of the GVSⅅ
- (e) the name and address of the Receiving Facility and date and time (including Loads mixed with waste from outside the geographic area of the GVS&DD);
- (f) the Collection Location(s) for each Load from within the geographic area of the GVSⅅ
- (g) the number of containers for each material type and each container's volume at each Collection Location within the geographic area of the GVSⅅ
- (h) the dates on which the Waste Hauler picked up from each Collection Location within the geographic area of the GVSⅅ
- (i) daily routing information for vehicles picking up or transporting Municipal Solid Waste from within the geographic area of the GVS&DD:
- (j) for each vehicle that picks up or transports a Load of Municipal Solid Waste from within the geographic area of the GVS&DD: (i) the vehicle identification number; (ii) the capacity of the vehicle; and (iii) Vehicle Operating Logs;
- (k) for each Load from within the geographic area of the GVS&DD, the weigh scale tickets or receipts from the applicable Receiving Facility; and
- (I) if the records created by the Waste Hauler do not use the definitions in this Bylaw to describe the materials, a glossary of terms used in the records created by the Waste Hauler.



Exemptions

Single-family residential garbage, source separated recyclables or product stewardship materials collected by municipalities, their contractors or product stewardship agencies are exempt from some record keeping requirements.

A provision will also be added to exempt construction and demolition waste from records management requirements.

Loads of construction and demolition waste and sourceseparated recyclables delivered to private facilities continue to be exempt from the generator levy.

Compliance Promotion Tools

- \$200,000 per offence maximum fine
- Enhanced inspection powers

Engagement

Metro Vancouver is seeking feedback on definitions, record-keeping requirements, and exemptions. Feedback learned during the engagement process will help to inform updates to the draft Tipping Fee Bylaw. There will be an opportunity to provide written feedback on a revised draft of the Tipping Fee Bylaw that will be produced following engagement. All feedback, as well as any additional updates made to the draft Tipping Fee Bylaw as a result of that round of written feedback will be shared with the Metro Vancouver Zero Waste Committee and GVS&DD Board for consideration and approval.

Smart Waste Program

The new smart waste program involves depositing location-based electronic devices in publicly accessible multi-family residential and commercial/institutional garbage containers to observe the movement of waste around the region.

Purpose

The purpose of the program is to enhance understanding of the movement of waste around the region, assist with future solid waste system and facility planning, and help confirm compliance with the generator levy.

Key information

- Assessments confirmed lowest environmental impact of methodologies reviewed, and negligible health and safety risks associated with the program.
- No personal information to be collected.
- The smart waste program will be implemented following engagement to identify opportunities to mitigate potential impacts.

Engagement

Metro Vancouver is engaging with solid waste and recycling industry members on how to best implement the smart waste program. Engagement will provide an opportunity for feedback on potential impacts of implementation and how those impacts can be mitigated. Learnings from the engagement process will help to inform a draft smart waste program implementation plan. There will be an opportunity to provide written feedback on the draft implementation plan.
